free trade between the united states and mexico would benefit both americans and mexicans they believed that nafta would be a win win proposition that would offer u s companies new markets for their products and mexicans the hope of living in a more developed country with the modern conveniences of wealthier nations blending rigorous economic and statistical analysis with concern for the people affected mexican women in american factories offers the first assessment of whether nafta has fulfilled these expectations by examining its socioeconomic impact on workers in a mexican border town carolyn tuttle led a group that interviewed 620 women maquila workers in Nogales Sonora Mexico the responses from this representative sample refute many of the hopeful predictions made by scholars before nafta and reveal instead that little has improved for maquila workers the women s stories make it plain that free trade has created more low paying jobs in sweatshops where workers are exploited families of maquila workers live in one or two room houses with no running water no drainage and no heat the multinational companies who operate the maquilas consistently break mexican labor laws by requiring women to work more than nine hours a day six days a week without medical benefits while the minimum wage they pay workers is insufficient to feed their families these findings will make a crucial contribution to debates over free trade cafta dr and the impact of globalization globalization trends and treaties such as the north american free trade agreement nafta have increased the access and flow of united states media and popular culture products in mexico limited research has been done examining the exposure of mexican audiences to u s media products and the possibility of mass media0 9s impact on mexican cultural identity this qualitative study examines how twenty college educated mexican women identify and engage with the transnational popular culture text of sex and the city satc a multi disciplinary theoretical approach mainly from cultural studies and media studies provides the

backbone for my study of a foreign audience0 9s identification and engagement with a u s popular culture text thematic categorization of my interview data showed that genre gender class and location all played a role in the media engagement process satc enabled these twenty women to examine their lived experiences in mexican society and be exposed to alternative viewpoints the women interviewed were active audience members that discussed their experiences as college educated career driven women associated with modernity but living in the traditional patriarchal society of mexico the women interviewed preferred watching television from other countries such as the u s because it resonated with their lived experiences more than the telenovelas which are the most common form of television programming in latin america in terms of discussing the representation of women on satc women talked about the gender roles myths and structural forces of mexican society to engage in resistive pleasure and to talk about gender politics for these mexican women discussing satc allowed them to express concerns over the representation of women in telenovelas the importance of having alternative viewpoints available to women and the experiences that have allowed them to foster spaces for change based on satc0 9s content and characters while factors such as education socioeconomics and geographic location framed the respondent comments satc was a source of strategic knowledge and cultural capital for women to open up new discussions with friends and family new ways of looking and living out their sexuality and ideas of the female body why do mexicans migrate to the united states is there a typical mexican migrant beginning in the 1970s survey data indicated that the average migrant was a young unmarried man who was poor undereducated and in search of better employment opportunities this is the general view that most americans still hold of immigrants from mexico on the move argues that not only does this view of mexican migrants reinforce the stereotype of their undesirability but it also fails to capture the true

diversity of migrants from Mexico and their evolving migration patterns over time using survey data from over 145,000 Mexicans and in-depth interviews with nearly 140 Mexicans. Filiz Garip reveals a more accurate picture of Mexico-U.S. migration in the last fifty years: there have been four primary waves—a male-dominated migration from rural areas in the 1960s and 70s; a second migration of young men from socioeconomically more well-off families during the 1980s; a migration of women joining spouses already in the United States in the late 1980s and 90s; and a generation of more educated urban migrants in the late 1990s and early 2000s. For each of these four stages, Garip examines the changing variety of reasons for why people migrate and migrants' perceptions of their opportunities in Mexico and the United States. favorite mexican fiesta recipes gooseberry patch gathered 60 south of the border favorites cookbook buyers will say olé for fiesta enchiladas savory pork carnitas easy taco soup and aztec salad for parties there s tex mex appetizer tart and jalapeño poppers even desserts like tres leches cake this little book also includes handy tips for serving up mexican style meals a feature gooseberry patch is known for an american writer and his wife find a new home and a new lease on life in the charming sixteenth century hill town of san miguel de allende mexico when los angeles novelist tony cohan and his artist wife masako visited central mexico one winter they fell under the spell of a place where the pace of life is leisurely the cobblestone streets and sun splashed plazas are enchanting and the sights and sounds of daily fiestas fill the air awakened to needs they didn t know they had they returned to california sold their house and cast off for a new life in san miguel de allende on mexican time is cohan s evocatively written memoir of how he and his wife absorb the town s sensual ambiance eventually find and refurbish a crumbling 250 year old house and become entwined in the endless drama of mexican life brimming with mystery joy and hilarity on mexican time is a stirring seductive celebration of another way of life a tale of americans who finding a home in mexico find themselves anew legendary travel writer paul theroux drives the entire length of the us mexico border then goes deep into the hinterland on the back roads of chiapas and oaxaca to uncover the rich layered world behind today s brutal headlines paul theroux has spent his life crisscrossing the globe in search of the histories and peoples that give life to the places they call home now as immigration debates boil around the world theroux has set out to explore a country key to understanding our current discourse mexico just south of the arizona border in the desert region of sonora he finds a place brimming with vitality yet visibly marked by both the us border patrol looming to the north and mounting discord from within with the same humanizing sensibility he

kahlo the tormented painter of the twentieth century long associated with gendered archetypes and symbols these women have achieved mythical status in mexican culture and continue to play a complex role in mexican literature focusing on contemporary novels plays and chronicles in connection to films television series and corridos of the mexican revolution estrada interrogates how and why authors repeatedly recreate the lives of these historical women from contemporary perspectives often generating hybrid narratives that fuse history memory and fiction in so doing he reveals the innovative and sometimes troublesome ways in which authors can challenge or perpetuate gendered conventions of writing women s lives oswaldo estrada is professor of latin american literature at the university of north carolina at chapel hill and the author of *ser mujer y estar presente* *disidencias de género en la literatura mexicana contemporánea* and *la imaginación novelesca* bernal díaz *entre géneros y épocas* the war between the united states and mexico was decades in the making although texas was an independent republic from 1836 to 1845 texans retained an affiliation with the united states that virtually assured annexation at some point mexico s reluctance to give up texas put it on a collision course with the united states the mexican war receives scant treatment in books most historians approach the conflict as if it were a mere prelude to the civil war the mexican cession of 1848 however rivaled the louisiana purchase in importance for the sheer amount of territory acquired by the united states the dispute over slavery which had been rendered largely academic by the missouri compromise burst forth anew as americans now faced the realization that they must make a decision over the institution s future the political battle over the status of slavery in these new territories was the direct cause of the crisis of 1850 and ignited sectional differences in the decade that followed in crisis in the southwest the united states mexico and the struggle over texas richard bruce winders provides a concise accessible overview of

the mexican war and argues that the mexican war led directly to the civil war by creating a political and societal crisis that drove a wedge between the north and the south while on the surface the enemy was mexico in reality americans were at odds with one another over the future of the nation as the issue of annexation threatened to upset the balance between free and slave states windsers also explains the military connections between the mexican war and civil war since virtually every important commander in the civil war including lee stonewall jackson grant mcclellan and longstreet gained his introduction to combat in mexico these connections are enormously significant to the way in which these generals waged war since it was in the mexican war that they learned their trade crisis in the southwest provides readers with a clear understandin in this love story of impossible odds award winning writer tim z hernandez weaves a rich and visionary portrait of bea franco the real woman behind famed american author jack kerouac s the mexican girl set against an ominous backdrop of california in the 1940s deep in the agricultural heartland of the great central valley mañana means heaven reveals the desperate circumstances that lead a married woman to an illicit affair with an aspiring young writer traveling across the united states when they meet franco is a migrant farmworker with two children and a failing marriage living with poverty violence and the looming threat of deportation while the college boy yearns to one day make a name for himself in the writing world the significance of their romance poses vastly different possibilities and consequences mañana means heaven deftly combines fact and fiction to pull back the veil on one of literature s most mysterious and evocative characters inspired by franco s love letters to kerouac and hernandez s interviews with franco now in her nineties and living in relative obscurity the novel brings this lost gem of a story out of the shadows and into the spotlight in the years following the mexican revolution visual images of la chica moderna the modern woman au courant in appearance and

attitude popped up in mass media across the country some of the images were addressed directly to women through advertisements as illustrations accompanying articles in women s magazines and on the women s pages in daily newspapers others illustrated domestic and international news stories promoted tourism or publicized the latest mexican and hollywood films in imagining la chica moderna joanne hershfield examines these images exploring how the modern woman was envisioned in mexican popular culture and how she figured into postrevolutionary contestations over mexican national identity through her detailed interpretations of visual representations of la chica moderna hershfield demonstrates how the images embodied popular ideas and anxieties about sexuality work motherhood and feminine beauty as well as class and ethnicity her analysis takes into account the influence of mexicanidad the vision of mexican national identity promoted by successive postrevolutionary administrations and the fashions that arrived in mexico from abroad particularly from paris new york and hollywood she considers how ideals of the modern housewife were promoted to mexican women through visual culture how working women were represented in illustrated periodicals and in the mexican cinema and how images of traditional types of mexican women such as la china poblana the rural woman came to define a domestic exotic form of modern femininity scrutinizing photographs of mexican women that accompanied articles in the mexican press during the 1920s and 1930s hershfield reflects on the ways that the real and the imagined came together in the production of la chica moderna
